Our Special Character

This past year saw investments in key areas to strengthen our Special Character, enhancing pastoral care, and reinforcing our academic reputation. Highlights include the establishment of youth groups led by Reverend Mannie Marara providing a vibrant opportunity for spiritual growth and connection for our young people at Hadlow and the Preschool. Reverend Wendy Scott, although transitioning from TSTB to a new role at St Matthew's Church in Masterton, continues to enrich our community, particularly as Chaplain to the Preschool. Her weekly story readings to the children there are a special and valued experience, providing for learning about the Anglican faith from a young age for our tamariki. The Bishop's representative on our board, Reverend John Hughes continues to provide sound governance for the whole Trinity system and has overseen a reinvigoration of the Special Character Committee bringing together members from across the school community.



We celebrated the opening of a dedicated prayer space at Hadlow, an initiative made possible by the generous support of the Hadlow Foundation and the Friends of Hadlow. This tranquil space stands as a testament to the strength of our partnerships and our unwavering commitment to fostering our Anglican Special Character. We also acknowledge the ongoing contributions to the Trinity Special Character from St Matthew's and Rathkeale Chaplains. Their dedication continues to enrich the spiritual and academic fabric of our schools.

Sport is an integral part of life at Trinity Schools, where it fosters Hauora—health and wellbeing—while developing character and engaging our community. Recognising the interconnectedness of our schools and their shared relationships with sport providers and stakeholders, a Trinity Sports Strategy has been developed, led by the schools, to unify the approach to school sports. This Together as One initiative has established clear values, ensures transparency, and aligns sporting resources across Trinity, through actively engaging students, parents, and staff for their insights. We look forward to the progress that the newly established Trinity Schools Sports Management Team make on the strategy over the next few months and years.

In the background we have made some great strides on the services we provide the schools. You would've noticed during the year that after a full review of the uniform services across the schools, we moved to a new provider with an improved level of quality and an online option, while retaining the second hand service which we know our families value. We have also completed a review of catering services, based on the great feedback we received from families, students and staff. The change over to a new provider will be happening in the new year, and while there is always a settling in period for such large changes as these, we appreciate the efforts of all to minimise this and look forward to the improved catering offering.
